LSSI Launches Medication-Assisted Recovery Program

Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) recently launched its new Medication-Assisted Recovery (MAR) Program at its Portage Cragin Counseling Center on Chicago's Northwest Side, bringing vital support to individuals struggling with opioid use disorder.

The MAR Program uses Suboxone, a safe, FDA-approved medication, to reduce cravings and withdrawal symptoms from opioids, lower overdose risk, and support long-term recovery. Medications for opioid use disorder decrease illicit opioid use, and reduce the risk of fatal overdose by about 50%. With a whole-person approach that focuses on harm reduction and accessible care, MAR is open to adults 18+ with current or recent opioid use, including pregnant women. Services are available in both English and Spanish.

“Our clients have long voiced frustrations about accessing MAR programs,” said Yolanda Nunez, the

Intouch Home Care Assists Congregation to Provide

Since 1981, LSSI's Intouch Home Care Program has helped older adults maintain their lives in the community and in their homes. Intouch lends its support to A Caring Place, a respite care program at Christus Victor Lutheran Church in Elk Grove Village. A Caring Place offers respite for family members caring for adults with mild cognitive or physical impairments, and a community of friends for its participants.

The caregivers of various participants shared the program's impact on their lives: “A Godsend.” “Vital.” “A lifesaver.” “What a relief.”

A Caring Place, launched 20 years ago by Christus Victor's Senior Pastor Stefan Potuznik and two community members, has 12 to 15 regular participants. It is led by Rosa Biondo, A Caring Place Coordinator, and staffed by Intouch Home Care Assistant Terri Lucas and 10 volunteers. Lucas has been a home care assistant with LSSI for 13 years. The program expands the personalized approach Intouch takes with clients in their homes.

“Intouch Home Care not only helps seniors maintain their independence, but also provides the loved ones and caregivers of our clients with support,” said Jeremiah Royster, Director of Intouch Operations and Growth. “Christus Victor has taken that same commitment into a community setting with A Caring Place. We're so honored to lend our services to such a valuable, worthwhile program.”

A typical day's activities include word games, trivia, and lunch. In between, there is laughter, an occasional nap, conversation, and a palpable affection between participants, volunteers, and staff.

“It's good trying something new,” said participant Neil. “They take good care of us.” Neil enjoys the history games, intellectual challenges, celebrations, and friendships.

His wife Marie agrees that the group is good for him—and her. “There's a lot of people going through this,” she said. “Even us talking about what we're experiencing really helps.”

program's registered nurse. "Now, LSSI is able to meet that need directly and provide vital treatment and support to the community."

The new program addresses a pressing need in the communities LSSI serves and reflects its commitment to compassionate, evidence-based care. While therapy and support groups are available and encouraged through LSSI, they are not required for MAR clients—removing barriers that often prevent individuals from seeking help. The MAR Program is part of LSSI's Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) model.

In addition to Nunez, the program is staffed by a dedicated, experienced team that includes a nurse practitioner, certified recovery support specialist, and medical assistant. The program brings together their clinical expertise and lived experience.

"I walk alongside my peers and support them in their recovery needs," said Latonya Carter, Peer Support Specialist. "We're all about person-centered care, advocacy, mentoring, self-care, and recovery education. It is a great honor to be a part of the MAR Program where I can utilize my many skills toward the change we want to see in the community."
